With the end of the current school year it is time to look forward to 2017-18. Next year you will notice several changes across our district. Beginning with personnel, Bellefonte Elementary School, Marion Walker Elementary School, the Middle School, and the High School will all have new principals. Each of our new principals bring with them experience, a love and passion for our students, and a deep understanding of our community. In Bellefonte Elementary, we welcome Mrs. Jennifer Brown. Mrs. Brown served our district previously as our high school principal. At Marion Walker, we welcome Mrs. Karen Mrs. Krisch served our district most recently as the principal at Bellefonte Elementary. At the high school, Mr. Michael Fedisson will now take over the reins. Mr. Fedisson moves into this position from the assistant high school principal position. Joining Mr. Fedisson and Mr. Park at the high school is Mrs. Rebecca Michaels. Mrs. Michaels previously served our district as the middle school assistant principal. In addition to these transfers, we would also like to welcome Mrs. Pam Vaiana to the position of Dean of Students at Bellefonte Elementary. Mrs. Vaiana served as the principal of St. John's elementary school prior to coming to Bellefonte Area School District where she has been our Director of Grants and Development.

In addition to the mentioned changes with our school administration, we will be hiring a new assistant principal at the middle school as well as a full time athletic director. Bellefonte Elementary and Marion Walker will each welcome an additional kindergarten teacher and our high school will implement a new autism support classroom to benefit those students who are moving up from our middle school. We are confident that

these changes will effectively serve our students, staff, and community and positively enhance the dynamics of each building. Please join us in welcoming everyone to their new positions and into your school communities.

Beyond personnel we will implement a new instructional system, Fountas and Pinnell, for English Language Arts at the elementary level. The Fountas and Pinnell Classroom System is a comprehensive balanced literacy approach that will benefit all students. This system will be fully implemented in grades k-2 for 2017-18 and be phased in for grades 3-5 over the next two school years.

At the elementary level, we will continue to investigate intervention programs for mathematics. students will also be looking forward to harvesting the vegetables from their school gardens. All buildings continue to explore new ideas and strategies that will enhance existing programs and create even more engaging learning environments for our students.

We will be 1:1 with our laptop computers in 2017-18. Our incoming kindergarten students, 5th grade students, and 9th grade students will receive new laptops that they will keep for several years. Other students will receive current laptops for their use until they move into either 5th or 9th grade at which time they will receive a new laptop for use. At the high school level, students will be able to take their laptops home with them in the evening. Please look for more information at the beginning of the school year that will outline student expectations for technology use and care of their laptops.

The MIS department will be performing a major upgrade of the district data center. The current technology has served the district for nearly 20 years. The upgrades will provide increased network speed and capacity as well as the latest technology in internet safety and security. All of the high school networking equipment will

Over the three-day period, over 120 students were given the opportunity to get into a kayak and paddle down Sunnyside Paddling Park. After the introduction, the students who participated in the activity continued to show their excitement and were eager to continue practicing the sport, some even discussing how they wanted to come back that evening for another lesson. In the days following, several students followed through and have since started kayaking with Mr. Kurtz. The entire activity was made possible with the help of several teachers from the elementary school including Erin Cernuska, Rebecca Hitchings, Michael Laskowski, Lauren Whitman, Heather Bathurst, Principal Karen Krisch, and parent volunteer Christine Dermota. Of course, none of this would have been possible without the help of Mr. Kurtz and several experienced kayakers who helped to ensure student safety in the water. Thanks to everyone involved, the participating students may begin their adventure in a nontraditional sport and help create a more active community.

The Autistic Support class at Bellefonte Elementary participates in experiential learning activities outside the classroom in order to expose students to various social situations. ### Learning About the Climate

Mrs. Kipp's students enjoyed a science class unit that was all about weather and climate. The kids conducted experiments simulating how the sun heats bodies of water and earth thus affecting the overall climate of a region. They then learned about cold and warm fronts and how weather patterns impact the weather and sometimes lead to violent storms, such as hurricanes and tornadoes. They also studied more about the water cycle and how cloud formation could indicate that the day's weather would be rainy and sometimes severe storms were on the way. They ended their unit by studying different types of clouds, such as cirrus clouds, stratus clouds, cumulus clouds, and cumulonimbus clouds, to name a few. Students enjoyed demonstrating what they learned about clouds by completing a poster project in which they used cotton balls and markers to show each type of cloud, which they labeled and wrote descriptions. After completing the unit, the kids were eager to step outside for recess to point to the sky and tell Mrs. Kipp what clouds they noticed and what the predicted weather would be. Some shared that they also do this with their families at home. Now the kids feel knowledgeable about what the weather forecasters mean when they talk about weather patterns and what will come in the days ahead.





replaced and new wiring run to support the new technology. Benner Elementary will receive new networking equipment and will be the first building to receive an upgrade in wireless support. All of the upgrades will be funded through the eRate program.

In our High School we will add the following classes to our College in High School options: US History 2 (History 601 University of Pittsburgh), AP Statistics (Stat 200 University of Pittsburgh), AP US History (History 600 and 601 University of Pittsburgh), US History 1 (US History 600 University of Pittsburgh), and MOS/Advanced Computer Applications (Intro to Computers: SCS110 Seton Hill).

In Bellefonte Middle School you will notice for next year the implementation of the Get More Math resource, a full year of Project Lead the Way (pre-engineering) for 25 8th grade students ,and a full year of art for 25 8th grade students. We will also be incorporating our Career and College Ready 339 initiative.

In our Buildings and Grounds department, we will be rolling out a new mobile application that will streamline operations with regard to tracking and completing work orders. In Human Resources, we will begin utilizing a new provider, Kelly Services, for our substitute personnel so we can better serve our staff and students.

From a safety perspective, we've done a lot to ensure a safe environment for our students and staff over the last several years both through programming and facility upgrades. For 2017-18, we will place additional exterior cameras at the middle school, Rogers Stadium, the baseball field, and the student parking lot. We will continue to work toward upgrading facilities with ADA compliance.

In addition to creating greater efficiency and providing more productive learning and working environments these changes will also save our district money as each of the changes not only brings resources to the table but is also more cost effective.

In food services we have a few changes that will enable your children greater access to our summer lunch program. The YMCA of Centre County free summer lunch program (open to all school age children and younger) will now have four summer locations within our district. The summer sites are: Bellefonte Elementary (12:00-1:00 PM), Pleasant Gap Elementary (12:00-1:00 PM), Beaver Farms Apartments (12:00-1:00 PM), and Governors Gate Apartments (12:00-1:00 PM). For more information please contact your elementary school office or property office.

Please look for a summer mailing with free and reduced applications and menus coming in July/August. Meal prices for next year are: Breakfast - \$1.00 (k-12) and lunch - \$2.30 elementary and \$2.65 middle and high school.






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
