Welcome to the Spring/Summer edition of our Red Raider Magazine

It is always beneficial to take a moment to reflect upon what we have accomplished. The 2015-16 school year was brimming with opportunities for our students, and we would like to share a few of this year's highlights with you.

We continued with reviewing and writing curriculum - this year physical education and health, fine arts, life skills, and our technology education and engineering departments began this process.

Chinese and Spanish World Language programs were expanded into second grade. We began developing our Interconnected Systems - the next step in our School Wide Positive Behavior Support program.

We implemented an elementary technology and business curriculum enabling our youngest learners to benefit from best practices in technology instruction.

Our Guidance Counselors developed what we call our 339 plan. This plan provides for additional curricular support and student learning opportunities with career exploration K-12.

Our math teachers began a collaborative project with Central Pennsylvania Institute of Science and Technology to develop shared strategies, vocabulary, and 'real world' models in mathematics. This will enable our students to see the relevancy

within what they are learning.

Our new science curriculum and resources were implemented: take a moment to ask your child if he/she enjoyed his/her learning experience. I'm sure he/she will be excited to share!

Departmentalization went into effect in grades 4 and 5.

Additional Chromebooks were added in each building to increase access to technology.

We began a weekend backpack program in collaboration with the YMCA.

The Facilities Committee initiated a district wide assessment for all facilities. The first phase of Rogers Stadium upgrades has begun with the installation of an ADA parking lot this summer.

We received a grant from the Department of Environmental Protection to develop gardens through our agricultural science

He was not looking directly at the course, but only saw by using the camera mounted on the "bot" which was programmed to a small monitor. He had to find the numbered blocks, pick them up, and deliver them to the corresponding dropbox....all in under 10 minutes. This was our first year at the event, and we won 1st place!




